Fundraising begins for machine that lessens hair loss due to chemotherapy



A group of Bundaberg women have banded together to begin fundraising for a second scalp cooling machine that will make a huge difference in the treatment of people undergoing chemotherapy.

Scalp cooling is a complementary therapy that may limit hair loss in patients undergoing treatment.

The Friendlies Foundation Public **Relations Officer Tunja Cottier** said the foundation donated the funds to The Friendlies for the purchase of the first machine for the Day Oncology Unit, at a cost of almost \$48,000.

"The Friendlies recognised the need to bring this technology to a regional center. One of the main aims of The Friendlies Foundation is to support The Friendlies in growing and expanding

healthcare services in Bundaberg to reduce the need for patients having to travel to Brisbane," Ms Cottier said.

"Dozens of patients have already benefited from scalp cooling during treatment, and with a second machine, we can make sure more patients have access to this therapy."

Day Oncology Nurse Unit Manager DA Halpin said the benefit of the complementary therapy was undeniable.

"We have had patients who were not going to try chemotherapy or who were going to travel to Brisbane who have now been able to have their treatments here."

"But also, a lot of patients, especially women, feel very self-conscious when they start to lose their hair. Being able to

potentially reduce that hair loss has an amazing effect on patients' emotions and self-confidence while they battle a cancer diagnosis and treatment."

The Fundraising group are hosting a multidraw raffle over the next few months to raise money for a second Paxman Scalp Cooling Machine for The Friendlies.

Tickets are \$5 each, with one of the major prizes being a Queen-Sized Bella mattress kindly donated by OMF.

"Tickets are already on sale, and we already have more than \$3000 of prizes donated from generous businesses and organisations like OMF, GHD, Goldwell, NAK and Nurses for Nurses," Ms Cottier said.

New Emergency Department CELEBRATES SIX MONTHS

After six months in operation, The Friendlies Emergency Department has treated more than 4500 people, with an overwhelmingly positive response to the new service. Since opening, the department saw an average of 24 patients a day.

Friendly Society Private Hospital CEO Alan Cooper said feedback since opening the service had been extremely positive.

"Our patients had been asking for an alternative emergency department to the public system for some years," he said.

"We have been grateful for the wonderful feedback and reviews we have received. When you are meeting people and they are thanking you for a service you know you have answered a need in the community."

Mr Cooper said The Friendlies Emergency Department offered minimal wait times and a department led by emergency specialists.

"In the past six months we have treated a number of conditions from minor health complaints, all the way to acute medical conditions such as heart attacks and broken bones," he said.

"We follow up with phone calls the following day, letters to GPs, as well as patients being able to return within 7-days for the same complaint without incurring any additional out-of-pocket costs."

"There are also no out-of-pocket charges for Workcover and DVA patients."

Opening the new service has also seen an increase in staff at the hospital.

"We have employed 16 nursing and support staff for the emergency department, but have also increased staff across other areas, including Unit 5. We are continuing our recruiting process as people continue to seek direct admission to The Friendlies," Mr Cooper said.

Grant provides new machine to improve recovery time and patient comfort

The Friendlies will be able to offer improved recovery time and comfort to patients with wounds, thanks to the purchase of a VAC Therapy System wound care machine, made possible with a grant from the St John's Grace Fund.

Due to increasing number of surgical patients at The Friendlies, The VAC Therapy System is a welcome addition to the current equipment available for this kind of wound care.

It assists by providing an optimal environment for healing and the removal of fluid to enhance the healing process, improving recovery time, independence and patient comfort.

Unit 3 Nurse Unit Manager Donna Stallan said the machine was useful for both surgical wounds, and also other patient wounds such as ulcers, injuries, burns and skin grafts.

"In addition to being a good option for a lot of patients, it also is a benefit to nursing staff as it reduces the amount of time spent redressing wounds," Mrs Stallan said.

Public Relations Officer Tunja Cotter thanks the St John's Grace Fund for its grant of almost \$15,000.

"This machine will primarily be used on our Unit 3 Surgical ward, but will be utilised across all our patient units as the need arises."

"As a not-for-profit hospital, receiving grants like this one means we offer more patients access to these kinds of treatments," Ms Cottier said.
