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The Friendlies Emergency Department CELEBRATES FIRST BIRTHDAY

More than 9000 patients have sought treatment at The Friendlies Emergency Department since it opened one year ago.

Celebrating its first milestone, Friendly Society Private Hospital CEO Alan Cooper said patient numbers to the emergency department in its first year showed community support for the service.

"We knew there was a need in the community for this service, as our patients were telling us all the time," Mr Cooper said.

"It is good to see that reflected in our patient presentations, but also in the positive feedback we receive about the service and its doctors and nurses.

"We have worked hard in our first year to deliver specialist emergency care during times people need it most, all while offering minimal wait times."



Mr Cooper said there had also been 1580 ambulance presentations to the emergency department.

"Patients can self present or get a referral from their GP to come to the ED, but patients can also be brought to The Friendlies between 8am and 8pm by ambulance – you just need to make your wishes known to the ambulance officers treating you," he said.

Mr Cooper said in its second year The Friendlies would consider opening the ED for longer hours.

"If the community need is there, it is certainly something we want to look at as we head into our second year," he said.

The Friendlies Emergency Department treated a range of patients and conditions in its first year, from acute injuries, broken bones and heart attacks through to minor health complaints.

Our focus is continuing our level of service with patient follow-ups the following day and letters sent to your regular GP. Patients are also able to return within seven days for the same complaint without incurring any additional out-of-pocket costs," Mr Cooper said.

"We continue to offer no out-of-pocket charges for Workcover and DVA patients."

LOCAL ARTISTS BRIGTHEN UP HOSPITAL WITH MURALS

High School students have brought smiles to the faces of patients at the Friendly Society Private Hospital by painting bright murals with local motifs – taking some plain brick walls outside patients' windows from drab to fab.

Senior Manager of Business Development Stuart Bonnett said in response to patients' requests for something to look at, The Friendlies put a call out to local high schools to design and paint a mural that was reflective of the Bundaberg region.

Bundaberg Christian College and Bundaberg North State High School both answered the call, each providing a 2.4m x 3.6m mural.

Mr Bonnett said the murals had delighted patients but had also had a positive impact on staff.

"The patient feedback was immediate, and we have been getting rave

reviews of the students' work – even staff are enjoying the murals. The students have really done a fantastic job and have brought some colour and life to a part of the Level 1 Courtyard walls that will last for years to come."

BREAD TAGS SUPPORT KIDS IN NEED

Staff at The Friendlies are making good use of bread tags and milk bottle lids – collecting them and donating them to charities turning them into wheelchairs and prosthesis for kids.

Serving hundreds of patients, staff and visitors through the kitchen and café everyday, bread tags and milk bottle lids are in abundant supply and until recently had ended up in the rubbish.

Catering and Café staff heard about the two initiatives and set about to collect the items – encouraging other staff to bring their items in from home.

With bucketful's collected each week, The Friendlies is operating as a collection point for both Bread Tags for Wheelchairs and Lids 4 Kids. Tags and lids can be dropped at the collection point beside main reception.

Bread Tags for Wheelchairs collects bread tags and recycles them for cash that is used to purchase wheelchairs in South Africa.

The organisation has been recycling the tags since 2006 and currently collect about 500kg of the plastic clips each month, which is enough to fund 2-3 wheelchairs.

Lids 4 Kids is part of the Envision Hands project, whose target is to turn milk bottle lids into bespoke aids for children by melting the plastic and using it to 3D print the prosthetic hands. They blew past their original target to recycle one million lids which created 100 hands and are now well on their way to recycling their second million.

FREE WIFI FOR PATIENTS

Having access to a free wifi network is something patients at the Friendly Society Private Hospital can now enjoy.

Senior Manager of Business Development Stuart Bonnett said free patient wifi was something the hospital had been developing for some time.

"Free wifi is by far the most common request from patients at The Friendlies," Mr Bonnett said.

"A lot of our patients are looking for things to occupy their time while they are in hospital, and mobile data can get quite expensive. Our free wifi will be beneficial to all patients, but especially those we see regularly who spend a lot of time

with us, like our day oncology patients."

The Friendlies Information Services team has been working behind the scenes to set up and test the network.

"It is fantastic that we have been able to offer this to patients at no cost, and have been able to roll out the wifi using existing resources."

Patients can simply search for The Friendlies in their wifi setting, with no password required.
